What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Adoration is a way to be present with the Lord and focus on actively listening to His word through prayer. During Eucharistic Adoration, the faithful pray to Jesus Christ, who is present in the Eucharist. The Eucharist, also referred to as the *Blessed Sacrament*, is typically kept in a Tabernacle at a Parish Church.

We can pray to God anywhere, and He is always within us. However, we have access to an especially powerful way to adore Jesus in the Eucharist. In the presence of the Eucharist, we acknowledge the power and sacrifice of the body of Jesus, who gave His life so that we may live.

It is His body, blood, soul and divinity that is really, truly, and substantially present in the Eucharist.

We adore and receive the Eucharist in communion at Mass, which is the most beautiful act of worship that we have. Jesus is truly present in all of the Tabernacles in the world. We can continue to adore Him in the Eucharist after Mass in a quiet time of prayer, contemplating Who we have just received. Being in the presence of the body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ gives spiritual strength and nourishment in a uniquely powerful way.

The Saints Encourage Us to Go to Adoration

"Whenever I go to the chapel, I put myself in the presence of our good Lord, and I say to him, 'Lord, I am here. Tell me what you would have me to do' . . . And then, I tell God everything that is in my heart. I tell him about my pains and my joys, and then I listen. If you listen, God will also speak to you, for with the good Lord, you have to both speak and listen. God always speaks to you when you approach him plainly and simply." - St. Catherine Labouré

"The time you spend with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the best time that you will spend on earth. Each moment that you spend with Jesus will deepen your union with Him and make your soul everlastingly more glorious and beautiful in heaven, and will help bring about an everlasting peace on earth." - St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta

"Know also that you will probably gain more by praying fifteen minutes before the Blessed Sacrament than by all the other spiritual exercises of the day. True, Our Lord hears our prayers anywhere, for He has made the promise, 'Ask, and you shall receive,' but He has revealed to His servants that those who visit Him in the Blessed Sacrament will obtain a more abundant measure of grace." - St. Alphonsus Liguori

"O Christ, let my greatest delight be to see You loved, Your praise and glory proclaimed and Your mercy honoured. O Christ, let me glorify Your goodness and mercy to the last moment of my life, with every drop of my blood and every beat of my heart. Would that I be transformed into a hymn of adoration of You. More on Eucharistic Adoration

The Eucharist is a living sign. You receive God Himself.

During the Mass, when the Priest utters the words of Jesus at the Last Supper, "This is My Body ... This is My Blood," (Mt 26:26-28) the bread and wine actually become the Body and Blood of Jesus. When we consume the Host at Holy Communion, God Himself truly enters into us. This is a radical truth. Should we not then return this ultimate act of love by giving Jesus our love, our worship, our devotion, our hearts, and our very livers?

How many of you say: 'I want to see His face, His garments, His shoes?' You do see Him, you touch Him, you eat Him. He gives Himself to you, not only that you may see Him, but also to be your food and nourishment. — *St. John Chrysostom*

Bishop Barron:

"This is not a metaphor, a symbol, or a spiritual idea; it really happens. In the Eucharist, the body and blood, as well as the soul and divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ and, therefore, the whole Christ, is truly, really, and substantially contained (CCC 1374)."

St. Augustine Seminary Offers Degree in Patristic Studies

St. Augustine Seminary in Scarborough is a founding and charter member of the Toronto School of Theology (at the University of Toronto). In 2022, the *Discastery for Culture Education* of the Roman Curia granted St. Augustine Seminary PONTIFICAL STATUS.

The Seminary will now be able to offer a course in Patristic Studies (study of the *Church Fathers*), and will be able to grant its own degrees.

The 2-year (4-semester) advanced Licentiate degree program is structured around 4-year mandatory courses in Patrology, Biblical, Exegesis, the development of the Doctrine of God, Christology, Ecclesiology, and the relation between the Church and Society. In addition, Students will be required to complete a thesis. The program also introduces Students to early Christian writers' intellectual and cultural milieu, such as Rhetoric and Philosophy.

Graduates of the program are equipped to teach in colleges, seminaries of Theology, and can also serve as catechetical resources for dioceses and various chaplaincies.


