

# Stewardship

One of the most financially sound ways to support the Archdiocese of Toronto is a gift of securities (stocks, bonds, mutual funds). When you donate stocks, mutual funds and other publicly traded securities to a registered charity, you pay no capital gains tax and receive a tax receipt for the full amount of the gift. It means a great tax break for you and more significant support of your Parish and various archdiocesan charities such as ShareLife, St. Augustine's Seminary, The Shepherds' Trust and many others.

The Archdiocese of Toronto was incorporated in 1845 by an Act of Parliament as a corporation sole, a legal entity consisting of a single ("sole") incorporated office. Therefore, individual parishes do not exist as separate legal entities but as constituted parts of the archdiocese. Thus, releases and other legally binding estate documents can only be signed by an individual with the authority to bind the archdiocese. These individuals include: the Archbishop of Toronto, both Chancellors, and the Controller. Due to the corporate structure of the archdiocese, a pastor does not have the authority to sign legally binding estate-related documents for the parish under his care. Whenever your parish becomes the beneficiary of a bequest, it always gets 100 per cent of its entitlement, however the Development Office administers the process of implementing the binding/signing authority principle. The correct legal name of the parish is:

Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation for the Diocese of Toronto, in Canada for the benefit of St. Maria Goretti Parish.

# Free Will

"You don't have free will, but don't worry?"

"There is free will," Lady Philosophy answered, "and no rational nature can exist which does not have it."

- Boethius, The Consolation of Philosophy.

There is a series of contemporary short videos on topics in contemporary physics by **Sabine Hossenfelder**. One of her videos was on 'free will.' She asserted that "free will is nonsense and the idea deserves going into the rubbish bin."

The idea of free will is incompatible with the laws of nature and is logically incoherent. The deterministic laws of nature apply to you & your brain because you are made of particles, and what happens with you is a consequence of what happens with those particles. A lot of people dismiss this as a philosophical position, called 'materialism.' You can refuse to believe that materialism is correct, but I can tell you that this way you will never understand how the universe really works. – S. Hossenfelder

Now, Dr. Hossenfelder is absolutely right in stating that there is no way to explain free will by the laws of physics. Nature is indeed deterministic. So, if you start with the assumption that there is nothing other than nature, then logic dictates that free will is only an illusion. The logically consistent atheist must deny the possibility of free will.

Theists have also denied free will, asserting that because God knows the future, everything is predetermined. **Martin Luther** wrote: "God's foreknowledge and omnipotence are diametrically opposed to our free will, for either God can be mistaken in foreknowing or we must act in accordance with his foreknowledge. No one has it in his power to think a good or bad thought, but everything happens by necessity."

This crude argument had already been discredited by the 6<sup>th</sup> century Catholic philosopher Boethius. Since God is outside of time, he sees all things as 'present.' So, just as I can see what you are freely doing now in the present moment, so God sees our freely chosen actions in the future, but he does not dictate them – they remain free.

St. Thomas Aquinas, in the *Summa Theologica*, cut through all the confusion. He wrote:

"God is the first cause of all things. He moves causes both natural (*laws of physics*) and voluntary (*free will*). Just as by moving natural causes He does not interfere with their being natural, so by moving voluntary causes, he does not deprive them of their freedom. Rather *God is the cause of this very thing in them!* He operates in each thing according to its own nature." God is the reason why our free acts are free.

Dr. Hossenfelder is wrong in stating that only atheist materialists understand 'how the universe really works.' Catholics also hold that 'natural things have natural causes.' However, the laws of nature deal only with *matter*. We have free will because we have *immaterial* souls.
