RCIA † Stories of Conversion

Gad Elmaleh

Jewish Comedian Converting?

Seinfeld or Barbra Streisand became Catholic.



Gad (a Hebrew name, one of the twelve sons of the Patriarch Jacob) was born in Casablanca to traditional Moroccan Jewish parents. He attended Jewish school. At the age of 17, he emigrated with his family to Canada. Later they moved to Paris. He was voted the "funniest man in France" and has been nominated for the French equivalent of an Oscar.

So why is he converting to Catholicism?

Is it the influence of three Catholic friends, including Charlotte Marie Casiraghi, a princess from the royal family of Monaco?

Could it be rebellion? In an interview on French television, he told how, at the age of six in Casablanca, he, with his father and sister, walked past a church. His father told him, "You see this building? You do not enter there." Gad recounted that he was "tempted" by the forbidden. He and his sister later stole into the building. The statue of the Virgin Mary "floored" him. He was also awed by the quiet and "calmness" of the cathedral, contrasted to the loud prayers of the Moroccan synagogue.

Gad's parents do not approve of his decision. Moroccan Jews are descendants of the Spanish Jews who, faced with the Edict of Expulsion of 1492, chose to relinquish all their property and leave Spain rather than convert to Christianity.

Gad asked his parents to appear in a film he was making about a Jew who converts to Christianity. On camera, he revealed to them that he is that Jew. His mother, unscripted, exclaimed, "'You're changing your God, so you may as well change your parents."

Gad himself said his decision is for spiritual reasons. When he first saw that statue in the Church at the age of six, he "fell in love at first sight." Later, the "Virgin Marie took me under her wing."

He gradually began asking the Virgin Mary to help him, "especially before shows" when he apparently felt anxiety, and he experienced a response.

The Personal God

Moroccan Jews are known to uphold Jewish tradition. Gad Elmaleh grew up in a home imbued with Jewish heritage. In the ancient world, rife with worship of various deities, Abraham, the first Jew, taught about the existence of an all-powerful God with whom he had a personal relationship. God called him, "Abraham, who loves Me." Judaism rejects any embodiment of God, and also the need for it. Yet, human beings crave form. How can they have a relationship with a formless God?

The God that Judaism introduced to the world cannot be seen, but can be heard. At Mt. Sinai. God revealed Himself through the spoken word. God showed Himself in the Ten Commandments as the God who intervenes in history for their benefit. This is a God who loves us and saves us, not only in the mega events like the Exodus, but also in the daily challenges of our individual lives.

At the same time. God is transcendent, larger than the cosmos, beyond time and space, infinite.



Judaism has different names for God, referring to different aspects of the Infinite as revealed to human beings. Two names are used in every blessing, where God is addressed both as Y-H-W-H and as Elokim. Y-H-W-H represents God as transcendent, all-loving, and all-merciful. Elokim represents God in nature, in the nitty-gritty of life, behind both the unexpected check in the mail and the washing machine that breaks down. God has no concrete form, but He manifests in our life in concrete ways.

Personal Prayer

Throughout Jewish history, Jews have had an intimate relationship with God through personal prayer. Moses, when his sister Miriam was stricken with leprosy, prayed, "Please, God, heal her." King David poured out his heart spontaneously to God in what have become known as the Psalms of David. We read those psalms from a book, but David forged them from his heart.

Yet, after the destruction of the Temple, the sages composed set prayers to be recited three times a day. For most Jews thereafter, the formal prayers of the siddur replaced personal prayer instead of augmenting it. This gave rise to the unfortunate phenomenon of "praying by rote," in which Jews speak to God like they are speaking to an answering machine.

A word of warning: God doesn't like whining. So, when you speak to God in personal prayer, start with thanking God for everything you have before you appeal to Him for what you lack.

A person whose business is failing or who is facing a health crisis or whose love life is floundering or who is nervous before going on stage can speak to God, with the faith that God has the ability to turn around every situation. The product of such reaching out is not always a spectacular rescue (although sometimes it is), but it is always the forging of an intimate relationship with the God who loves you and does what is ultimately best for you.

The television interviewer asked Gad: "What's Jewish about you? One word." Gad replied, "Esprit," the spirit. Although often obscured by more mundane passions, the Jewish soul longs for an intimate relationship with God.

Notre Dame de Paris A blessed restoration

In the 4th century, Paris, on the Île de la Cité, became the Christian capital of the Frankish kingdom. The city's real growth began in the 12th century after the Norman invasions. The city became a place of artistic and intellectual activity. with colleges and a university of philosophy and theology. At the same time, the Crusades to Jerusalem, to recover the Holy Land shrines from Muslim occupation, and pilgrimages to Santiago de Compostela in Spain saw thousands of faithful travel along the roads. The Île de la Cité was a crucial crossing point over the Seine, and the faithful flocked to the Cité district. Maurice de Sully, Bishop of Paris, began the construction of a new and vast cathedral to accommodate the faithful. In the 13th century alone, the population of Paris doubled. St. Louis brought back the relics of Christ's Passion from Jerusalem. They arrived in Paris in 1239. The king carried them in procession to Notre-Dame. The relics were later kept in the Sainte-Chapelle until the Revolution. They were transferred to the treasury of Notre-Dame in 1806. The cathedral expanded to become a model of religious architecture. During the Renaissance, tastes evolved, and its appeal waned. In the 17th century, through the vow of Louis XIII, France was placed under the protection of the Virgin. A new high altar was installed by Louis XIV. More renovations took place in the 18th century. The Cathedral was damaged by weather and the Revolution. Victor Hugo's amazing story,

Since the 12th century, an altar dedicated to Mary has been located against the southeastern pillar of the cathedral. This site has been a focal point of devotion since the Middle Ages. In the 19th century, the architect Viollet-le-Duc placed there a statue of the Virgin with Child known as "Notre Dame de Paris," or the "Virgin of the Pillar."

"The Hunchback of Notre-Dame," boosted interest in the Cathedral, and the French state decided to restore it in the 19th century. It was classified as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1991. It is a major center of Christian worship and the

most visited monument in France.

This sculpture dates back to the mid-14th century. It was originally in the Saint-Aignan chapel of the former cloister of the Canons on the Ile de la Cité. In 1818, it was transferred to Notre-Dame to be placed on the trumeau of the Portal of the Virgin, replacing the 13th century Virgin that was destroyed in 1793, during the Revolution.

The Notre Dame de Paris Statue is a classic depiction of the Virgin Mary holding the Child Jesus. It is associated with piety and protection.

This statue holds great significance for the faithful and visitors to the Cathedral. It symbolizes Mary's divine motherhood as well as her relationship with Jesus. For many believers, it also represents comfort and hope.

The statue has survived several major events in history, including the devastating fire in the cathedral in April 2019. Although the Cathedral sustained significant damage, the statue of the Virgin with Child was miraculously preserved and restored. Over the centuries, the statue of the Virgin with Child has inspired numerous artists, writers and thinkers. It has been depicted in painting, sculptures, poems and stories, testifying to its cultural and spiritual impact.
