Holy Week Notes

Passion Sunday: Holy Week begins, 10 April

HOLY WEEK, and the PASCHAL TRIDUUM, are the centre and pivot of the entire Liturgical Year, for the events re-lived during this time are at the very heart of our faith. Passion Sunday Mass begins with the *Blessing of Palms* and the *Processional Gospel*. The Palms blessed on Passion Sunday are placed in significant locations in our homes as a reminder that we welcome our Saviour into the city of our hearts.

Chrism Mass: St. Michael Cathedral, 12 April

The Archbishop of Toronto, His Grace Thomas Collins, presides at the annual Mass of Chrism. The Priests who serve in the Toronto Archdiocese renew their commitment to serve, and the holy oils used in the Sacraments (Sacred Chrism, Oil of Catechumens, Oil of the Sick) are blessed.

Holy Thursday: Mass of the Lord's Supper, 14 April

This Mass of the Lord's Supper opens the **Paschal Triduum**. The washing of the feet re-enacts the amazing sign of Christ's mandate to the Church to be of service to humankind. The liturgy concludes with the procession of the Blessed Sacrament, and Eucharistic Adoration until midnight.

Good Friday: 15 April; Paschal Fast, Early Liturgy, Solemn Liturgy of Our Lord's Passion, Collection for the Holy Land Shrines, Stations of the Cross

A reminder: **Good Friday** is a day of both *Fasting* and *Abstinence*. Unless precluded by health reasons, we join our sacrifice to that of Jesus by abstaining from meat, and by limiting ourselves to only one significant meal to enable us to accomplish necessary work.

The Church fasts on Good Friday and Holy Saturday to honour the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus, and to prepare to share more deeply in the joy of the Resurrection. Holy Saturday is a time of preparation for the celebration of the Easter Vigil, the dawning of the Resurrection feast.

The SOLEMN LITURGY OF OUR LORD'S PASSION enables us to walk with Jesus on the Via Dolorosa. The *Passion Narrative* is from the Gospel of John. This year, there will be two main Liturgies:

12.00 noon Early Good Friday Liturgy

3.00 pm Solemn Liturgy of Our Lord's Passion

The Collection at our Good Friday liturgies will be used to support the Church in the Holy Land. Its mission includes:

- promoting a better knowledge of the Holy Land;
- caring for the shrines where Jesus taught the Gospel;
- solidarity with the world's oldest Christian diocese.

The Evening Liturgy, including the Stations of the Cross, will feature a reflection on the *Seven Last Words* of Jesus.

Holy Saturday: Easter Vigil Liturgy, 16 April

The EASTER VIGIL LITURGY is the liturgical highlight of the Church year. **St. Augustine** said that the Easter Vigil, the night when Jesus rose from the dead, is the *Mother of all Vigils*. Everyone is invited to join their hearts and souls in prayer as we welcome the newly-Baptized into the Church.

Easter Sunday: 17 April

Our renewal of Baptism promises, sealed by the sprinkling of the new Holy Water blessed at the Vigil the previous night, expresses our faith in the resurrection of Jesus.

The Papal Apology



Chief Wilton Littlechild felt a swell of emotions and tears in his eyes as he heard **Pope Francis** apologize at the Vatican on 1 April 2022 for the role of Catholics in managing the residential schools that Prime Minister John A. Macdonald and the Canadian federal government created in the 1880's.

The Pontiff stood before a room of nearly 200 Canadian Indigenous delegates in the *Sala Clementina*, one of the halls at the Vatican, and asked for God's forgiveness for the deplorable conduct some church members had shown.

"I want to say to you with all my heart: I am very sorry," Pope Francis said in Italian during a concluding meeting with First Nations, Inuit and Métis delegates.

Until 1883, Canada did not have a residential school system. It had some schools founded by individual Churches to teach indigenous children.


Based on these pre-Confederation boarding schools, the government sought partnerships with representatives of the Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian, and other churches to operate the schools and to carry out this mission for the state. Religious instruction and discipline became the primary tool to "civilize" indigenous people and prepare them for life as mainstream European-Canadians.

To achieve this goal, Prime Minister Macdonald authorized the creation of new residential schools and granted federal funds for those that were already in place. Macdonald, like others in the government administration, was very clear about the need to break the connection between the students and their communities: "When the school is on the reserve, the child lives with his parents who are savages; he is surrounded by savages, and though he may learn to read and write, his habits and training and mode of thought are Indian. He is simply a savage who can read and write."

From 1883 onward, the federal government sought a system to enroll indigenous children in schools. Day schools and industrial schools were to serve alongside the residential schools to meet this growing challenge. James R. Miller, an important historian of the residential schools, estimates that a great number of indigenous students, in fact, studied in day schools, although the residential schools left the most painful marks on indigenous communities.

The Pope's Good Friday Stations

Each year, Pope Francis tasks a different person or group with writing meditations for his Stations of the Cross liturgy on Good Friday evening. After the 2019 Stations, the Pope asked the chaplaincy of the "Due Palazzi" prison in Padua, Italy, to compose the prayers for 2020. Authors include prisoners, family members of prisoners, a catechist, a civil magistrate, volunteers and a Priest who was falsely accused and later exonerated and acquitted. Each meditation offers a personal story recounting resentment, anger, guilt, despair and regret, as well as hope, faith and mercy.

One prisoner condemned alongside his father to a life sentence said that to date, "The harshest condemnation remains that of my own conscience: at night I open my eyes and I desperately search for a light that will shine upon my story." A prisoner charged with murder wrote about Jesus's First Fall while carrying the cross, saying when he fell and took someone's life, "for me that fall was death." Recalling an unhappy childhood that led him to anger and resentment, the prisoner said he didn't realize that "evil was slowly growing inside me."

Two parents whose daughter was murdered spoke of the living hell they have experienced since their daughter's death, which not even justice has cured. However, when despair seems to take over "the Lord in different ways comes to meet us," they said, adding that "The Gospel commandment to perform acts of charity is for us a kind of salvation: we do not want to give in to evil. God's love is truly capable of renewing life because, before us, his Son Jesus underwent human suffering so as to experience true compassion."
