Sinners and Saints Alike Need Divine Mercy

This Sunday is the Feast of the Divine Mercy.

The first thing I want to say about mercy is: I need it! There is no progress in the Christian life — indeed, there is no Christian life — without mercy. We could even say that progress in the Christian life is itself an ever-deeper awareness of our need for and experience of God's mercy.

I bet, like me, you've rolled your eyes whenever you've read the saints talking about what "wretched sinners" they were. Oh, sure you were, Mother Teresa ... whoever! But the more I've journeyed into intimacy with Jesus (which is to say the more I've journeyed into the depths of God's mercy, which is to say the more I've journeyed into the depths of my own misery), the more I've come to believe that these saints really were aware of how sinful they were.


After all, that's what made them saints: they didn't cover up their sinfulness with a pious mask; they didn't hide their sinfulness behind self-righteous "accomplishments." They simply basked and bathed – continually – in God's mercy.

That's the journey of the Christian life. It's realizing that all we are before God are souls with a gaping, bleeding need for his mercy. Without exception. That's what our humanity is. Even Mary, conceived without sin, is a nothing in her humanity but a need for God's mercy – a need that, in her case, was met right at the moment of her conception and sustained her throughout her life, but a need nonetheless!

Sometimes, growing up, we get the impression that "saints" are somehow those who are no longer "sinners." That's the dichotomy; that's the way we talk. We talk of saints and sinners as if they are two groups of entirely different kinds of people, as if saints weren't also sinners.

Growing up with this false dichotomy in my head, I thought I needed to hide my sin to be "acceptable," to be "lovable." For years I hid my inner misery from myself, from others, from God, because I thought it was repulsive; I thought it made me "unlovable." To those who aren't full of mercy, it is repulsive.

But, guess what mercy means? The Latin form is *misericordia*, and it means "having a heart for the misery of others." In fact, our misery actually entices God. It attracts his heart to us.

Hiding my misery from God and others, I came to believe I had some sort of "strength" to offer my wife, my kids, the Church, and the world. The Lord in his mercy (and my wife, in hers) has been helping me see that all I really have to offer is my weakness. To this end, I have found the teaching of St. Therese of Lisieux of great benefit. Pope Pius XII summed up her insights well when he wrote:

"We must take St. Therese at her word when she invites the most unregenerate as well as the most perfect to count nothing of value before God, save the radical weakness and spiritual poverty of a sinful creature."

Speaking from experience, it seems that only through various painful trials, in which our misery becomes undeniable, do we come to accept that God's grace is sufficient for us, that his power is made perfect in our weakness (see 1 Corinthians 12.9), and that he is "rich in mercy" (Ephesians 2.4).

If he is rich in mercy, we should have no fear taking an honest look at our gaping, bleeding need for it.

From restless self-seeking in the present moment

Deliver me, Jesus.

From disbelief in Your love and presence

Deliver me, Jesus.

From the belief that my life has no meaning or worth *Deliver me, Jesus.*

From the fear of what love demands

Deliver me, Jesus.

From discouragement

Deliver me, Jesus.

That You are continually holding me, sustaining me, loving me *Jesus*, *I trust in You*.

That Your love goes deeper than my sins and failings and transforms me *Jesus*, *I trust in You*.

That not knowing what tomorrow brings is an invitation to lean on You *Jesus*, *I trust in You*.

That You are with me in my hurting *Jesus, I trust in You*. That my suffering, united to Your own, will bear fruit in this life and the next *Jesus, I trust in You*.

That You will not leave me orphan, that You are present in Your Church *Jesus*, *I trust in You*.

That Your plan is better than anything else *Jesus*. *I trust in You*.

That You always hear me, and in Your goodness always respond to me *Jesus, I trust in You*.

That You give me the grace to accept forgiveness and to forgive others *Jesus*, *I trust in You*.

That You give me all the strength I need for what is asked *Jesus, I trust in You*.

That my life is a gift Jesus, I trust in You.

That You will teach me to trust You *Jesus, I trust in You*. That You are my Lord and my God *Jesus, I trust in You*. That I am Your beloved one *Jesus, I trust in You*.

We Remember our Instructions for

CONFIRMATION

Water: a symbol of new life in Christ



Each time we Christians enter a church, dip our hand in the holy water font, and trace with water the sign of the cross on ourselves, we are recalling our *Baptism*. This simple gesture reminds us that God has created us anew through Baptism. When we cross ourselves, we recall that we are Baptized; this helps us remember that we are disciples of Jesus and members of God's family.

As Baptized disciples, we also prepare and celebrate our *Confirmation*. These two sacraments are so closely linked that preparing for confirmation means first recalling our Baptism. And Baptism and Confirmation prepare us for Eucharist, for celebrating at the Table of the Lord.

Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist

When adults or older children prepare for initiation in the Catholic Church they spend a lot of time, sometimes years, preparing themselves. At the end of this time, the Church celebrates with them the three sacraments of initiation:

Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist.

If we grow up in a Catholic family, we are Baptized as young children, shortly after we are born. As we grow, we learn how to make a Confession, and we receive the Sacrament of *Reconciliation*. Then we prepare to share in *Holy Communion* which is to share in the body and blood of Christ. Then we can study our faith more deeply, and receive the Sacrament of *Confirmation*.

Our Baptism story

1. My Name

My parents chose a special name for me. My Christian name connects me to all the holy men and women who lived before me, and who were heroes.



2. Where I was Baptized

My family belonged to a Parish, a community of faithful people. They asked the Church to welcome me as a new member, and to make me a brother or sister of Christ by Baptism.

3. Date of Baptism

At conception, every person begins 2 journeys; the journey of the **body**, which ends in death, and the journey of the **soul**. The soul is joined to Christ in Baptism, and this opens the door to eternity.

4. Godparents

Some people stood up for me and agreed to be my Prayer Partner with God, asking him to help my family to raise me as a member of his Church.

5. Special Memories

When I see the pictures of my Baptism, I recall the stories my family told me about my big day.

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Wisdom is the gift of knowing the right choices to make to live a holy life. The gift of Wisdom helps you to avoid the things that could lead you away from God.

Understanding is the gift of comprehension, or the ability to grasp the meaning of the teachings of the Church. The gift of Understanding helps you be tolerant and sympathetic of others. It helps you sense when someone is hurting or in need of compassion.

Counsel, or Right Judgment, is the gift of prudence. The gift of Counsel helps you make choices to live as a faithful follower of Jesus.

Courage, or Fortitude, is the gift that helps you stand up for your faith in Christ. The gift of Courage helps you overcome any obstacles that would keep you from practicing your faith.

Knowledge is the gift of knowing and enlightenment. The gift of Knowledge enables you to choose the right path that will lead you to God. It encourages you to avoid obstacles that would keep you from him.

Reverence, or Piety, is the gift of confidence in God. This gift of reverence inspires you to joyfully want to serve God and others.

Wonder and Awe, or "Fear of the Lord," is the gift of wonder and respect that encourages you to be in awe of God. The gift of Wonder and Awe moves you to so love God that you do not want to offend him by your words or actions.

The Fruits of the Holy Spirit

These are signs that the Holy Spirit is alive within us and helping us to live the Catholic faith:

Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Generosity, Gentleness, Faithfulness, Modesty, Self-control, Chastity.

The Communion of Saints

Just as the Sacraments are part of our Christian family heritage, so too are people who have lived before us and worked to create the kingdom of God.

At Mass, we say that we believe in the *Communion of Saints*. This is the assembly of all Christian women and men who have



lived and died and are now living in heaven. Think of the Communion of Saints as our *heroes*, or as our cheering section upstairs. We often ask the Saints to pray with and for us so that we may be stronger in our faith.

St. Maria Goretti, St. Albert and St. Joan of Arc are three of the best-known members of the Communion of Saints. They love us and ask for God's help so that we can live as disciples.

CONFIRMATION The Commissioning: Go and Make Disciples of all Nations

BAPTISM, CONFIRMATION and the EUCHARIST together comprise the SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION.



Confirmation completes Christian initiation, and strengthens the Candidates by the gift of the Holy Spirit. They are empowered to serve as witnesses of Christ, to spread and defend the faith by their words and deeds.

The Commissioning of the Disciples (Matthew 28.16-20)

- ¹⁶ Now the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had directed them.
- ¹⁷ When they saw him, they worshiped him; but some doubted.
- ¹⁸ And Jesus came and said to them, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me.
- ¹⁹ Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit,
- ²⁰ and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

My Sponsor

Confirmation Sponsors "Accompany the candidates, present them to the Bishop for anointing, and then help them fulfill their baptismal promises by the influence of the Holy Spirit." (*Rite of Confirmation*, # 5)

Since a Sponsor has such a significant role to play in the development of Confirmation candidate it is important that this person be one who is a living example of faith, one whose actions reflect the actions of Jesus.

A Sponsor offers prayer and encouragement during the Confirmation preparation process and as their candidate matures in life.

The Arrival of the Holy Spirit

After the Passion, Death and Resurrection of Jesus, the Apostles were left amazed, and they were unsure what to do. Jesus came and spent 40 days with them, and promised that they would receive the Holy Spirit.

The Descent of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2.1-4)

- When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place.
- And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting.
- ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them.
- ⁴ All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.



Reconciliation

Receive this Sacrament, and return a completed slip at your next Mass.

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12.1-7)

- Now concerning spiritual gifts, brothers and sisters, I do not want you to be uninformed.
- ⁴ Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit;
- ⁵ and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord;
- ⁶ and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone.
- ⁷ To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.



The Life of the Early Church (Acts 2.14a, 36b-38,41-42)

- ¹⁴ Peter stood with the eleven and addressed the crowd,
- ³⁶ "Let the entire house of Israel know with certainty that God has made him both Lord and Messiah, this Jesus whom you crucified." *The First Converts*
- ³⁷ Now when they heard this, they were cut to the heart and said to Peter and to the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?"
- ³⁸ Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit.
- ⁴¹ So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added.
- ⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

The Spirit in the Old Testament

The Hebrew word for "spirit" (*ruah*) can also mean "wind" (Gn.8:1; Num.11:31; 1Kg.18:45) or "breath" (Gn.7:15; Ec.3:19; Jer.10:14). The two images can be combined so that *wind* is the *breath of God* (2 Sam 22:16; Ps 18:15; Is. 40:7).



"Breath" is a common expression in Scripture for the human spirit (Gn.41:8; Exod 6:9; Ezek 3:14). The start of life is divinely willed; and the end of life is the return of our spirit to God, who gave it in the first place (Ec.12:7). The power of God is visible in myriad ways, but it was seen especially in the charismatic leaders of the Israelites,

the prophets, and those who fulfilled God's saving will.

As with the Hebrew *ruah*, the Greek word *pneuma* can likewise mean "wind," "breath," or "spirit." But in the New Testament, we also see explicitly what was hinted at in the Old Testament: that the Spirit is not an impersonal force, but a divine Person, who is God along with the Father and the Son.

Confirmation

Gift of the Holy Spirit

BAPTISM, CONFIRMATION and the EUCHARIST comprise the SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION. Confirmation completes Christian initiation, and strengthens the Candidates by the gift of the Holy Spirit. They are witnesses of Christ, bound to spread and defend the faith by their words and deeds.

Origins of the Sacrament

The Old Testament prophets announced that the Spirit of the Lord would rest on the awaited Messiah for his saving mission. The descent of the Holy Spirit on Jesus at his Baptism in the Jordan by John was the sign that this was the expected one: the Son of God, who would communicate the Spirit to the entire messianic people. On Pentecost, filled with the Holy Spirit, the Apostles began to proclaim the mighty works of God, and Peter declared this outpouring of the Spirit to be a sign of the messianic age.

In the Letter to the Hebrews, the doctrine on Baptism and the Laying on of Hands is listed among the first elements in Christian instruction. The Laying on of Hands is recognized as the original sign of the Sacrament of Confirmation, which perpetuates the grace of Pentecost in the Church.

The Bishop

The original ministers of Confirmation are the Bishops, the successors of the Apostles. They have received the fullness of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. (The Bishop may transfer this mandate to the local Parish Priest.) The Sacred Chrism used for the Anointing was blessed at the Mass of Chrism at the Cathedral during the previous Holy Week.

The Sponsor

The Sponsor is a fully-initiated member of the Church who:

- ❖ Represents the community; ❖ Will support the parents;
- ❖ Testifies that the Candidate will be a witness for Christ.

The original Godparent may perform this duty; or another adult who serves as an example of Christian living.

The Name

The Confirmation Name is the Christian *Baptismal* name, or the name of another *Saint* who will serve as a lifelong patron and prayer partner to the newly-confirmed.

Effects of Confirmation

The purpose of the Sacrament is the full outpouring of the Holy Spirit, as it was given to the Apostles on Pentecost:

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind...divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them the ability. (Acts 2.1-4).

The entire Church benefits by Confirmation: it conveys the grace of *Pentecost*, enabling us to live with the fruits of the Holy Spirit:

Charity, Joy, Peace, Patience, Generosity, Goodness, Perseverance, Mildness, Faith, Modesty, Continence, Chastity.

Confirmation has several important effects:



- (1) It makes us more aware of God;
- (2) It releases the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit: Wisdom, Knowledge, Counsel, Understanding, Courage, Piety and Reverence of the Lord.
- (3) It unites us more firmly to Christ;
- (4) It binds us more perfectly to the Church;
- (5) It gives us strength to spread and defend the faith by our words and actions in order to:
 - **№** be true witnesses of Christ;
 - **▼** confess the name of Christ boldly;
 - ₱ never be ashamed of the Cross.

Confirmation perfects the grace of Baptism, and imprints a spiritual mark or permanent, indelible character on the Christian's soul. A Candidate for Confirmation who has attained the age of reason must profess the faith; be in the state of grace; desire to receive the Sacrament; and be prepared to assume the role of disciple and witness to Christ, both in the Church and in the world.

The Liturgy

Confirmation is ordinarily celebrated within the context of the Holy Mass. Following the Proclamation of the Word of God, the Sacrament is administered in this order:

Presentation of the Candidates Homily Renewal of Baptismal Promises Laying On of Hands ¹ Anointing with Sacred Chrism ²

¹ LAYING ON OF HANDS: The Bishop faces the people and introduces the prayer. Then he (and any concelebrating Priests) extend their hands over the Candidates, and ask the Father to send the Holy Spirit upon them.

² Anointing with Chrism: Candidates walk to the Sanctuary. The Bishop goes to them individually, takes some Chrism, addresses them by their Confirmation Name, and makes the Sign of the Cross on their foreheads.
