

Prayer and actions are inseparable, and both have immeasurable influence in the world.

History of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was first proposed in 1908 as an observance within the Catholic Church by **Fr. Paul Wattson**, founder of the FRANCISCAN FRIARS OF THE ATONEMENT in Graymoor, New York. Fr. Wattson, an Anglican, founded his order in order to reconcile Protestants and Catholics. Fr. Wattson and his community eventually joined the Catholic Church. In November of 2014, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops endorsed the cause for Fr. Wattson's canonization.

Since the founding of the World Council of Churches in 1948, many other Christian denominations around the world have come to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in January. Protestant women's groups organized a World Day of Prayer in March to promote solidarity. Eventually, Catholics were invited to join.

Cardinal Collins: 'Instead of developing an overall culture of care, we are rushing toward death on demand'

In Ontario, we allow cooling-off periods for gym memberships and new condominium purchases but the federal government doesn't seem to believe a similar reflection period is necessary for euthanasia.

New legislation has been introduced that radically expands the eligibility criteria for "medical assistance in dying" or MAiD. Pain medication and other resources and procedures can indeed be used effectively to medically assist people who are dying. But that is not what MAiD involves: it means giving a lethal injection to people who are not dying, so that they will die.

Those who oppose euthanasia expressed concern in 2016, when it was first legalized, that once the state legally provided death for some, it would only be a matter of time before its criteria would be expanded. This was dismissed as a slippery slope argument; we were told that "safeguards" would protect the most vulnerable.

Now, less than four years later, we are far down the slope.

If Bill C-7 is passed, those whose death is "reasonably foreseeable" will no longer need a 10-day reflection period before receiving a lethal injection. One will not need a terminal illness to be euthanized. Under this legislation, any serious incurable illness, disease, or disability would render a person eligible for euthanasia. This is distressing for many who feel vulnerable and will now meet the criteria for lethal injection. People with disabilities already face substantial challenges relating to employment, housing, appropriate medical care and support. We should be alarmed that those who have struggled for decades to be treated with equality may well be pressured, whether from family, friends or even their own health care professionals, to "ease their burden" and end their lives.



Their lives matter. They should never be seen as a burden to our society. These people need assisted living, not assisted death.

This is a new chapter of death on demand. Canada has cast aside restrictions at a far quicker pace than any other jurisdiction in the world that has legalized euthanasia.

Heart of Jesus, Symbol of Love

The Church, governed and taught by the Holy Ghost, has approved and recommended devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. In our age of religious indifference, when fervor and charity have grown



cold, Jesus exhibits to the world His Sacred Heart as the symbol of God's infinite love - the symbol of His own generous self-sacrificing love for men. Jesus shows His Divine Heart as a furnace whose burning rays of love are able to reanimate faith and rekindle love in hearts grown cold and ungrateful.

But why His Heart? Because in every language, in every age, the heart is regarded as the natural symbol of love and affection. What more natural and expressive symbol is there, then, of the excessive love of Jesus than His Sacred Heart? The direct and material object of devotion to the Sacred Heart is the real, physical Heart of Jesus - the Heart of flesh, the living and loving Heart of our Blessed Lord; the Heart that beat in His Divine breast at the moment of the Incarnation; the Heart that loved us during the life of Jesus on earth.

Corona Virus update *Procedures re*: COVID 19

Re: Update on Coronavirus for Parishes & Staff

As you are aware, active cases of the coronavirus (COVID-19) worldwide have led to understandable concern among the faithful. The number of cases in the province of Ontario remain low, with 17 confirmed positive cases of the coronavirus as of March 3, 2020.

Our goal is to act responsibly, based on credible information from reliable sources. We have been in regular contact with local health officials and will continue this dialogue. Information from the provincial website (Ontario.ca/COVID-19) provides basic background on the coronavirus and practical advice for all organizations:

Coronaviruses are spread mainly from person to person through close contact, for example, in a household, workplace or health care centre. There are everyday actions that can help prevent the spread of germs that cause respiratory illnesses. Take these everyday steps to reduce exposure to the virus and protect your health:

wash your hands often with soap and water or alcohol-based hand sanitizer • sneeze and cough into your sleeve • avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth
avoid contact with people who are sick • stay home if you are sick

Regarding liturgical practices, local health officials have indicated that it is not necessary to alter current practices at this time.

Parishes are encouraged to use the above information to remind parishioners about the importance of practicing healthy hygiene. Also, parishes should ensure that those distributing communion wash their hands or use hand sanitizer before and after distributing Communion.

The latest communication from the City of Toronto Medical Health Officer is enclosed for your information. Please continue to pray for all those impacted by the coronavirus. Be assured that we will continue to work with local health officials and keep you updated as appropriate.

March 2 statement from Dr. Eileen de Villa, Medical Officer of Health, on new positive cases of COVID-19 in Toronto.

Today, Dr. David Williams, Ontario's Chief Medical Officer of Health, provided an update on the novel coronavirus: COVID-19. A total of 10 confirmed cases of COVID-19 has been reported in Toronto in 2020. Two of these people have since recovered from their illness. The remaining eight people are currently recovering in self-isolation and Toronto Public Health is following up with them and their close contacts. Part of our current focus is to identify potential cases of COVID-19, to follow up with these people directly and to identify their close contacts. We use current evidence to assess potential health risk, provide education, further instructions and to reduce the potential of virus spread. We also do this work for measles, mumps, and hepatitis A, and not just for COVID-19. We are working with our local and provincial health system colleagues to set up increased local surveillance systems to quickly identify individuals possibly infected with COVID-19. I continue to be asked if we would consider recommending postponement of events or limiting places where people gather in large numbers. These are significant measures that must be assessed, evaluated and taken only after we balance preventing the spread of infection with the need for people and communities to function. At this time, we are not recommending these approaches, but examples such as limiting nonessential public gatherings are public health measures that can be used to further protect our community, if our local situation changes. I have also been asked what actions people can take to prepare themselves if our local situation changes. I think it is helpful to consider the supplies you may need at home if you became unwell with any illness, not just COVID-19. For families, this may mean considering your household needs and how you may address them if someone in your household becomes unwell. Things that people may consider include having supplies onhand so you do not need to leave home if you become ill, or how to plan childcare needs. If the situation changes, other measures people can consider could include changing their daily routines to reduce their exposure to crowded places. One of the most important things residents can do to prepare is to stay informed by regularly reviewing credible information sources including our website www.toronto.ca/coronavirus.
