Parishioners are invited to pick up their 2021 Sunday Offertory Envelopes in the Vestibule. This year, due to the pandemic



Fr. Edwin Galea 40th Anniversary of Ordination 29 November 1980-2020





On Sunday, 29 November 2020, **Fr. Edwin Galea** celebrates his 40th Anniversary of Ordination to the Priesthood. He was ordained by **Cardinal Gerald Emmet Carter** at St. Ambrose Church, Etobicoke, where he had served as a Seminarian and Deacon. He was joined at the Ordination Mass by a number of relatives from Malta including his mother Mary's brother **Carmenu** and his family; and by his father Paul's youngest brother, **Fr. Daniel Galea**, at that time assigned to the Franciscan Monastery of *San Francesco a Ripa*, off *Piazza Mastai* in Trastevere, Rome. Fr. Edwin's first assignment as a Priest was to Annunciation Parish in Don Mills. He has been at St. Maria Goretti Parish since 2007.

Archbishop A. Sample leads rosary, exorcism to bring peace to Portland, Oregon

Dakota Hulsey was diligently setting up tables in a downtown Portland restaurant on 17 October 2020. Out of the corner of his eye, he saw 225 people walking in procession behind the Eucharist on busy Northwest Everett Street. Hulsey paused for a moment, went to the window and gazed with folded hands, purple surgical gloves and all. "I'm not Catholic," he said. "I just recently found God."

What Hulsey had witnessed was a morning procession from St. Mary's Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception to a city park where Portland Archbishop Alexander K. Sample offered a rosary for peace and conducted an exorcism for a city that has suffered riots for more than four months.

Two demonstrators have been killed over election-related division and many police injured. In early October, groups promoting indigenous rights toppled popular statues of Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt.

"There is no better time than in the wake of civil unrest and the eve of the elections to come together in prayer, especially here in Portland," Archbishop Sample said before the procession. "The Catholic Church takes the promotion of unity, and accordingly peace, as belonging to the innermost nature of the church," he said. "For this reason, the church fosters solidarity among peoples, and calls peoples and nations to sacrifices of advantages of power and wealth for the sake of solidarity of the human family."

Catholics across western Oregon took part in the morning prayers Oct. 17 via livestream. There were almost 8,000 views on Facebook. "Mary, your son is the Prince of Peace," the archbishop said as he knelt before the Blessed Sacrament, placed on an altar under spreading elm trees. "Through your intercession, may he bring peace to our cities and our communities, may his peace reign in our hearts." Prayers were offered in English, Latin, Spanish, Vietnamese and Tagalog. The archbishop conducted a Latin exorcism rite meant to cleanse a community of evil.

The voice of a fitness coach at a nearby gym mingled with the solemn prayers, as did the wail of sirens and the general hum of Saturday morning traffic. Worshippers were not distracted; on the contrary, they seemed to revel in the mix, hoping the sacred would infuse the secular.

"What we did contrasts with what has been going on in our city and all this disarray," said Carolina Ruth Valdez, who attends St. Stephen Church in Southeast Portland. "Jesus is the Prince of Peace. No Jesus, no peace."



Valdez said she came because she wanted to give witness to a weary city that Jesus is with the people no matter what is happening. As the final prayers ended back on the cathedral steps, Valdez started a cheer: "Viva Cristo Rey!" The crowd responded enthusiastically and as the cathedral bells tolled the noon hour.

Sandra Kvalheim, who lives in nearby Vancouver, Washington, said it's important for people of faith to be seen in public promoting belief and peace. "They see your run-of-the mill Catholic on the street and see that their religion is so important to them."

Mary Miller, a member of St. Pius X Parish in Portland, said the anti-religion undertones of Portland protests worry her. She hopes the march presented a strong message: Catholics promote human rights and dignity.

"We know we need a lot more prayer, a lot more conversation about this," Miller told the Catholic Sentinel, newspaper of the Archdiocese of Portland. "What is happening is not the right way to go about it. The church has the answer. It's always going back to first things. What are first principles and what is our foundation in faith? I think that will address a lot of the confusion today."

Miller's son Justin, a student at Holy Trinity School in nearby Beaverton, hopes for an end to the violence. "I don't want any more people to get hurt," he said.

Organizers were prepared in case the half-mile Catholic procession met with violent foes. Nine burly Knights of Columbus from St. Anthony Parish in Tigard, Oregon, posted themselves around the event and kept an open eye. Everything went smoothly, said Scott Young, who led the guard. In fact, onlookers seemed fascinated and asked Young what was happening.

Standing in the back of the group in the park was Portland Police Officer Stephen Le, fingering a red rosary and praying along. Le grew up at Our Lady of La Vang Parish in Portland and belongs to Christ the King Parish in the suburb of Milwaukie.

Diocesan Pandemic Norms

Message from Cardinal Collins, 17 November

Thank you for all that you continue to do during these challenging days. As you are aware, at this time, the City of Toronto, Region of Peel and York Region are now in the Province of Ontario's "Control" stage (Red Zone). Over the past week, I have been in regular dialogue with local officials in these areas to convey the effective measures that parishes have been implementing through the WorshipSafe protocol and to better understand the challenges faced by local municipalities in trying to reduce the rapid spread of Covid-19. While we know that our 30% capacity restrictions as well as our extensive health and safety protocols have been extremely effective, we must also seriously consider the direction of local medical officers asking that places of worship further restrict attendance at liturgical services.

At this time I am directing parishes in York, Toronto and Peel Regions to implement the following measures:

By Tuesday, 24 November 2020, parishes must restrict attendance at all liturgical celebrations (Sunday & Daily Mass, Weddings, Funerals, Baptisms, First Holy Communions, Confirmation, etc.) to 50 worshipers in the entire building, excluding those who are involved in ministry (Priest, cantor, greeters, etc.).

As outlined in our protocols, ensure strict adherence to sanitization, distancing and other measures.

Only essential meetings should take place in parish halls or other Church spaces at this time. They should be restricted to 10 people and ensure that all appropriate health and safety measures are in place (use of masks, hand sanitizer, physical distancing, etc.). Virtual meetings should replace in-person meetings wherever possible.

Parish offices: follow Phase 2 – *Limited Operations*.

I recognize this is an extremely challenging and difficult situation for clergy, pastoral teams and parishioners. We must also be mindful of our primary concern – our love of neighbour and our collective need to reduce the potential transmission of Covid-19 during this period of pandemic. We will continue to keep you

updated with any other relevant information. Thank you once again for your incredible work.

Terrorist Attack In Nice

Three people were murdered in Notre Dame basilica in Nice, France, on 29 October 2020. The victims, a man and two women, were inside the basilica before the first Mass of the day. One of them, named by French media as 55-year-old **Vincent Loquès**, was a devout Catholic who reportedly worked at the basilica for more than 10 years. He was a sexton, or lay member of staff, responsible for maintenance and welcoming visitors to the church. Mr Loquès was opening the church on Thursday morning, when the attacker slit his throat, police say. A father of two daughters, Mr Loquès was known and loved by many parishioners.

They described him as a man who "always smiled" and dedicated his life "to serving the Church." "He fed the refugees, he had a good heart," said one person who came to pray for Mr Loquès.

A second victim has been named by the Brazilian foreign ministry as **Simone Barreto Silva**, a 44-year-old mother of three who was a caregiver for the elderly. Born in Salvador, Brazil, she had lived in France for 30 years. Severely injured, she managed to flee the attacker and took refuge in a restaurant near the church. "Tell my children I love them," she told paramedics, according to French cable channel BFM TV. She died a short time later. Brazil's foreign ministry confirmed one citizen was among the victims of Thursday's "atrocious attack." In a statement, President Jair Bolsonaro offered his "deepest condolences to the family."

The third victim, a woman aged about 60, has not yet been named. She was found "almost beheaded" near the holy water font.
